



This past Advent I was blessed to be able to go on pilgrimage to Italy and Bosnia. While on pilgrimage, I had the wonderful experience of celebrating the Mass in many Churches. These varied in age from 30 years old to 600 plus years old. All of them were beautiful and all of them were Catholic. One of these churches stands out in my memory above the others. It was not the most ornate or the best because of its architecture or location, but rather the Church symbolized the organic nature of our Catholic faith. I say organic because our Church is continually growing. It is a term used in theology to express that our understanding and worship of God grows day to day, year to year, and century to century. Although it is growing, there remain concrete truths and expressions that faithfully represent our historical life and worship. These truths not only remain but they are the source of the growth.

Let me digress back to the church. This little church in the town of Spoleto, Italy was part of a monastery in which my pilgrim group was staying. Spoleto is an ancient city dating back to 250 years BC. Now the Church did not look like much from the outside because time had definitely been taking its toll. The inside as well was not all that remarkable but its foundation, well its foundation was deeply moving (spiritually and emotionally). When you journey below the present Church you come into a first century Christian Church. Here you find an ancient house Church, which was secret because Christianity was still illegal. (For proof of this you only need to see the remains of San Ponziano, a 15 year old martyr killed there in the year 167 but that is a different story).

The original church is very small. It is about the size of a large living room. As the Church grew and became legal it was expanded. It was expanded by using the columns and stone from the ancient pagan

temples that stood nearby. Eventually, a first church and then the current church were constructed on top of the original.

This church was a powerful, physical expression the reality of our faith building and growing. The first century church started with a small space and a simple altar. In the expansion frescos of Christ were added that looked out to the people. Currently, upstairs, Christ is present is more and more visibly in the art and statures of the "new" church. What makes this church remarkable is that the faith of the people built and sustained this church. The physical space had to lend itself to the needs of the faithful. As they grew, the buildings grew with them.

As Catholics, we cannot really separate ourselves from the spaces we worship in. We believe our religious spaces aid and lead us to fuller worship. However, we cannot limit our ability to worship and adore God to one space itself. The first Masses in Rome were in the catacombs before the tombs of the martyrs. The Mass could not remain there. What the faithful did was take the reality of their faith in Christ, handed to them through the martyr's sacrifice, and place it in their buildings of worship. As I celebrated the sacred mysteries in that church in Spoleto I realized how our chapels, and our future church are built upon these buildings as well. Our church buildings rest upon the martyrs, the early house churches and the ancient grand cathedrals. In Spoleto, the reality of the faith celebrated in the first century structure is not diminished by the new church, it just lies within it. I had a powerful connection of our worship today with that of Christian antiquity.

We as a community are making the movement to the construction of a new church. For us, this requires new land as opposed to just building a new structure on top of and old one. When the time comes for us to build and move we can take our

history and the Christian mysteries celebrated in our present chapels with us. We can bring stone and statue, wood and window, history and mystery with us to our new site. Currently we are growing into a place that is calling us to worship differently than we have in the past. We need not fear the future because as Catholics, our past is always our foundation. St. Peter's Basilica in Rome has been torn down and rebuilt several times but at each incarnation many things from the old were brought to the new. I am sure there was some reluctance to raze the old and build the new. However, it ended up being an incredible gift to the world. When our own Cathedral was built at the turn of the 20th century the entire catholic population of Idaho could fit inside for Mass, now that just not possible.

I do not know what shape our new church will take but I believe it will be familiar. The space may be new but the mysteries and history will be ancient and well-known. In no way am I telling anyone that they should be emotionally stoic about leaving their currant chapel, but what I want to stress is this: Our faith, our history, our celebration of the sacraments is not confined to one space. We are a Catholic people who continue to obey Jesus' command to, "Do this in memory of me." This command would also be very fitting to our building process in that whatever we do build, and how we go about it, we must do it in memory of Christ. All of our actions, sacrifices and prayers must be rooted in the love of the Lord. As a community we have many opinions but we are called to possess one heart and one mind. Unity comes with sacrifice. Jesus demonstrated this to us in his passion. When the time comes to build let us remember that every Christian church shares the same foundation, namely Christ.

Stewardship opens an avenue of thought that allows us to give without always questioning what we will get in return. Every one of us is talented in some way. Stewardship encourages us to use any talent we have to benefit an individual, the Church, or the community.

"What shall I return to the Lord for all the Lord has given to me?" (Ps 116:12) Jesus asks us to demonstrate our love for him through our generosity to others. In our everyday lives, he calls us to share our gifts of time, talent, and treasure with others.

"While we have the opportunity, let us do good to all people--but especially to those of the household of the faith" (Gal 6:10)

How do we give of our time, talent, and treasure?

Stewardship involves intentional, planned, and proportionate giving of our time, talent, and treasure. Following are some comments that further explain what we mean by intentional, planned and proportionate giving:
Intentional: A well thought out, deliberate discussion is made to live out the Christian life in a certain way. That way is to thank God for all our blessings by returning to the Lord a portion of the time, talent, and treasure allotted to us.

Planned: At the beginning of every year, each Catholic household in the diocese would plan and made stewardship of time and talent a part of their lifestyle and stewardship of treasure a part of their budget.

Proportionate: A decision is made to give a certain percentage of one's time and one's income to the Church and other charities.

Where has the school year gone? Here we are looking at the last *five* weeks of school already! One thing is for sure the students of Holy Spirit Catholic School have certainly been busy and look to end the year that way!

As important as the season of Lent is for the church, the school does its very best to make sure the students actively participate as well. The school participated in the community wide *Feed the 5,000* food campaign. Our goal was for each student to contribute one item – a total of 165 items – but instead we collected **637** items. Hopefully through this project the students learned a good lesson in stewardship in the importance of taking care of those in need and the importance of community service.

On Holy Thursday the students watched a performance of the Lord's Passion presented by the second and third grade students, who were assisted by their teachers Nancy Corgiat and Debby Belcher. Although simple, this reenactment done by such young innocent children brings a whole new touching version of the Passion. Following the play all of the students attended a Seder Meal in the basement of the church which was presented by the sixth grade students and teacher Megan Bayrd. The purpose and meaning of the Seder Meal was explained, and what each piece of the meal represented. School was closed in observance of Good Friday and Easter Monday.

Property for the New Church and School for Holy Spirit Catholic Community Has Been Purchased for us by the Diocese of Boise.

1. The property, which is 181 acres, has plenty of room for a Church and School and our parish gets to choose the best spot on this piece of property for our new facilities.
2. The property, which is located off Gathe Rd., is close to existing properties and the new Trail Creek residential development.
3. The price of the property was \$5,000 an acre which is considerably less than other properties that were under consideration.
4. The City of Pocatello is favorable towards annexing the property for development.
5. There will be the possibility of sharing the costs of roads, etc. with other developments in the area.

We want to thank everyone who came to the April 23 Public Forum. We appreciate your support and suggestions. We want to especially thank all those who signed up to participate on the subcommittees for design and other areas such as communication, prayer and transitions. For those of you who were not able to attend, copies of the presentation are available at the parish office.

Between now and the end of summer, there will be many opportunities for parishioners to get involved in this process. Please check out future editions of the bulletin, newsletter and our website (www.hscc.org) for information as to the hiring of an architectural firm and the schedule for the design of the Master Plan as it becomes available.

Please contact the parish office if you have any questions. If we work together as one parish community, the vision of a new Church and School on the new property will become a reality.

SCRIPTURE QUESTION OF THE WEEK

Each month the community newsletter will list the gospel for each Sunday along with a Question of the Week for adults and children. We invite you to use this resource each week to reflect with your family on the message of Jesus Christ and how it applies to your daily life. We also encourage you to use these scripture verses and questions as part of your opening prayer for meetings of the parish councils, organizations, and ministries.

May 7th—Fourth Sunday of Easter (Called to be shepherds) John 10:11-18 (the Good Shepherd)

Key Passage: Jesus said, “I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep.” (John 10:11)

Adult Question: Whom are you shepherding in your life right now, and who shepherds you?

Child Question: Who has been like a shepherd to you by their example? For whom could you be a shepherd?

May 14th—Fifth Sunday of Easter: (Strengthening your faith) John 15:1-8 (the vine and the branches)

Key Passage: [The vine grower] removes every branch in me that bears no fruit. Every branch that bears fruit he prunes to make it bear more fruit. (John 15:2)

Adult Question: When have you been “pruned” by your experiences in a way that led to greater abundance?

Child Question: When have you felt stronger or better because you did something hard to help another person?

May 21st - Sixth Sunday of Easter: (Love of your neighbor) John 15:9-17 (a disciple’s love)

Key Passage: Jesus said, “This is my commandment, that you love one another as I have loved you.” (John 15:12)

Adult Question: How is love of others connected to love

for God?

Child Question: Who needs Jesus’ love this week? How can you show them his love?

May 28th—Seventh Sunday of Easter: (Praying for others) John 17:11-19 (Jesus’ prayer for the disciples)

Key Passage: Jesus prayed to his Father] “I am asking on their behalf; I am not asking on behalf of the word, but on behalf of those whom you gave me, because they are yours.” (John 17:9)

Adult Question: Who needs you to pray for them this week, as Jesus prayed for his disciples?

Child Question: When and where do you need the Holy Spirit’s help to speak out?

June 4th— Pentecost: (Acting with courage) John 20:19-23 (appearance to the disciples)

Key Passage: Divided tongues, as of fire, appeared

among them, and a tongue rested on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability. (Acts 2:3-4)

Adult Question: When has the Holy Spirit given you the strength to act with courage?

Child Question: When and where do you need the Holy Spirit’s help to speak out?
