



Summer is here

With summer; vacations come to many people. The School is over. Weekends are inviting to go fishing, camping or simply traveling around. But work does not stop. Life goes on with people working even extra hours a day, as daylight goes forever at this particular season. I am thinking about Farmers, Ranchers and everybody working in the fields. I am thinking also about parents whose work never ends and many more people who can not be without working. But summer is certainly inviting to go and enjoy the outdoors!

In the Gospel of Mark for July 23, Jesus is looking for a place for him and his disciples to rest: "Come away by yourselves to a deserted place and rest a while." But they could not get away: People saw them leaving and arrived at the place before them." Jesus saw them and began to teach them many things because he saw them like sheep without a shepherd.

Centuries before Jesus, and also in the service of God's reign, prophets like Ezekiel, Amos, Jeremiah and Elisha had similarly exercised their ministries. Each was called by God to a service he had not intended; each was entrusted with a message that would prove to be both unpopular and fraught with personal risk. Nevertheless all of them were also endowed with the very Spirit of God that enabled them to serve, empowered their efforts and emboldened their words.

By Jesus' words and example, he teaches his disciples from the first to the 21<sup>st</sup> Christian centuries that the agenda of

Gospel ministries is shaped by the needs of those they have been called to serve. Jesus' own agenda encompassed the entire gamut of the human experience. He was attentive to the physical as well as the psychological, spiritual and emotional needs of his contemporaries. On July 2, Mark will feature Jesus restoring to life the beloved daughter of Jairus, a synagogue official who believed in Jesus' God-given power to heal. En route to Jairus' home and without an appointment, Jesus will cure a faith-filled woman of a hemorrhage that had afflicted her for years, thus illustrating that his availability to other's needs, like his power to help them, is absolute.

Jesus' compassion ruled his days. Whether it was convenient or not, he was to give himself to the service of others, being their shepherd, teaching them the truth of the good news, tending to their needs like feeding considerably more than 5000 persons with barley loaves and dried fish. This meal by the way anticipated the gift of the Eucharist, whereby Jesus would feed all the hungers of sinful humankind with himself. Jesus is indeed the one to follow as our model teacher and guide.

In the interim between Jesus' advents, the same Spirit enlivens, empowers and emboldens all of us Jesus' disciples. St. Paul is an outstanding example of untiring dedication in proclaiming the Good News, and at the same time sharing with us the cost of discipleship. So it is up for us today to continue the work and ministry of Jesus. Even though resting and/or going on vacations are part of our basic human needs, the work of the Gospel, the work of the church never ends. Our parishes remain busy all through the seasons with a variety of ministries that are necessary to our Christian life. Many people will do some

kind of ministry or ministries all through their lives. We in our parish are indebted to so many who had ministered to us in the past and today.

As we read in the second book of Kings how a man came from Baal-shalishad bringing to Elisha, the man of God, twenty barley loaves made from the first fruits, and fresh grain in the ear. Elisha said, "Give it to the people to eat." But his servant objected, "How can I set this before a hundred people?" Elisha insisted, "Give it to the people to eat. For thus says the Lord, 'they shall eat and there shall be some left over.'" And when they had eaten, there was some left over, as the Lord had said. Hope we all can give the best of ourselves to others even when we claim that we have done enough. We are indeed the Body of Christ!

Let us remember that *stewardship* is not one thing; it is a way of life that includes all aspects of life. It is about sharing, and loving all of God's gifts. It is not something that can be done one time, once a month, or weekly. It is day in and day out cooperation with God

Let us find joy in serving one another!

### **Vacation Bible School**

Eighty children from Holy Spirit Catholic commu-

nity spent a week at St. Paul chapel exploring several countries and began to understand what it would be to trade places with children from around the world.

The children experienced a week of the music and songs, language, and patron saints of five countries from all around the world. The kids learned to appreciate the prayer practices and customs of each country they visited. We even had time for fun and games.

The daily snacks they enjoyed at vacation bible school reflected the reading of a parable of Jesus. The parable of the “Sower” of seeds inspired a healthy snack mixture of nuts, seeds and fruits to represent the story. Each day was an adventure in eating. The children also participated in the free summer lunch program sponsored by Holy Spirit School, and funded by the USDA.

Our journey began in Brazil where the kids learned to speak “Jesus loves me” in Portuguese, as well as in Spanish, and Polish. We tried to master the phrase in Chinese and Swahili, too. In any language, the children learned how much Jesus loves them.

Patron saints were featured from each country, and the children prepared a skit or song to illustrate the

lives of those saints. On Sunday evening, families enjoyed a potluck dinner prior to the performance of the skits and songs that the children had learned during the week.

Music and the sounds of children’s voices filled the church each day. We opened daily with “Jesus Is His Name” complete with gestures and energy! By the end of the week everyone knew how to “sign” and sing five or six new songs.

Everyday, two special young men led games outdoors so that the kids could run off some energy, and learn cooperation at the same time. When the children returned from their session they were ready to begin again. It was a favorite activity for everyone.

The church was decorated with the crafts created by the kids. Chinese “light of the world” lanterns swung overhead while Mexican “papel picado” banners lined the walls. The entire community enjoyed the children’s festive creations during the following Sunday’s liturgy.

Planning has already begun for VBS to be held next spring. The time, the place, and the date will be determined according to the evaluations that were filled out, and returned by participants at this first annual event. It’s a humbling task to adequately express the thanks owed to the parents, grandparents and teens who devoted so much time and energy to the success of vacation bible school. It was through their

### **Parish Youth Education**

The Faith Formation Commission in consultation with Fr. Enrique Terriquez, and the Director of Faith Formation, Ann Hysell have made certain recommendations for parish religious education at Holy Spirit.

Beginning in October, children and youth will attend core-belief /religious instruction in a classroom setting. Instruction will take place at the HSCS, the gym, and downstairs hall, on Sunday afternoon. Sacrament preparation for first Eucharist and first Reconciliation will continue with family members attending with their children. The age levels affected are Kindergarten through 12<sup>th</sup> grade. Preschool may be offered during mass times if parents request and staff the effort. Bilingual options will be included.

Twelve weeks of lessons will be presented in three-week blocks, followed by an intergenerational gathering or Faith Festival. Church feasts and seasons are part of the instruction and will be celebrated in conjunction with the Church liturgical year and the parish schedule.

The Commission members are at work on the class schedule at this time. A formal registration of youth and children and families will be announced in the bulletin and on our website hsc.org as soon as it is available.

**SCHOOL EXCELS ON ISAT TESTS!**

Holy Spirit Catholic School is excited to announce the results of the 2006 Spring ISAT (Idaho Standard Assessment Test) scores. In grades second through sixth, the scores were as follows: in the subject of Reading 92% of our students were at the Proficient level, with 59% of them at the Advanced level; in the subject of Language 94% of our students were at the Proficient level with 56% of them in the Advanced level and in the subject of Math 95% were at the Proficient level with 49% of those being in the Advanced level!!! These are great scores and should put the school in the top 10% of schools in the State of Idaho! We are very, very proud of our students for their hard work here at the school. Congratulations also to the teachers who have helped each of these students to achieve these great scores and the parents for their dedication to their children.

As many of you know, Mr. Anderson did not sign his contract to be the Principal at Holy Spirit Catholic School next year. We are very sad to see him go, but we are very happy for the time he was here! Mr. A has left the school in great shape: the faculty is strong, enrollment is increasing, and the quality of our education offered is superb! Even without Mr. A, we will go on!

As of the writing of this letter interviews have been held to hire a new principal and there are many good prospects, so the hiring committee is very excited! The future of the school is in for some changes but we are strong and looking forward to the new and exciting challenges and adventures ahead of us!

**Youth News**

Youth ministry has been identified as an area within our community that is in need of growth. Frank Mercadante, spokesman for Cultivation Ministries, provided such a vision. A discipleship approach for youth ministry was outlined at a deanery wide seminar sponsored by the Diocese of Boise. “For the sake of our young people, we do need to find and use words that capture the essence of what it means to follow Jesus. We need to provide for youth a handle on who they can be as Catholics and Christians. They need a worthy, uplifting, and scripturally sound term that describes the exciting and challenging adventure of serving Christ, without any ambiguous or negative connotations. That very designation could be *disciple*” (15).

So begins the process of growing Disciples of Christ. Holy Spirit parish, along with St. Bernard’s-Blackfoot, Holy Rosary-Christ the King, Idaho Falls, Presentation of the Lord-St. Mary’s American & Aberdeen, and two parishes in northern Idaho participated in a training session for the purpose of

planning for Strategic Youth Ministry. We plan to Prepare, Sow, and Grow And Reap the benefits of becoming dedicated Disciples of Christ.

The main difference from this *Vital* program and former, worthwhile attempts at youth ministry is *prayer*. In the past it has been a largely overlooked component of other programs. Frank waited till the second day of training, after those who attended, Peggy Kaiser, Cathey Heggenberger, Kathy Alexander and Ann Hysell, had learned about the process of preparing for success in youth ministry.

What he said about the power and necessity of intercessory prayer struck us as an essential truth. Our Catholic faith teaches us this truth. We all know it is true, yet in our day-to-day rush to accomplish the many duties each of us must do; it’s often overlooked and under utilized.

In the development of the *Vital Program Youth Ministry* each person, and each group will be asked to pray specifically for the success of youth ministry. Many people will be asked to pray for each young person and their intentions. Parishioners will be asked to pray for

the recruiting process. We intend to “beg the Lord of the harvest to send laborers” (Mt: 9:38). We intend to contact known individuals who are committed to regular prayer. We know how you are! Look and listen for our needs expressed in the Prayers of the Faithful. We intend to contact the homebound requesting their daily prayer for the youth ministry process.

“Prayer taps into a power that far transcends the abilities of humans. As someone once said, “Prayer is the slender nerve that moves the muscle of omnipotence.” (*Growing Teen Disciples pg. 102*)

The prayers of the community and the hard work of those dedicated to youth will cause the harvest to be great.
