

## Advent is here again:

Advent is a time of expectant hope, when we look to the future and the past in order to focus on the present. God's reign is in our midst! In order to keep our hope expectant, we need to turn to the Gospels who at first glance seem to be biographies of Jesus' life, but in fact, they really are faith proclamations, stemming from the apostolic preaching about salvation in Jesus; according to what the Official Roman Catholic teaching tells us.

Halfway through Advent, the Gospel's story in Luke tells us about people who came out from Jerusalem and other cities and towns to listen to John the Baptist in the wilderness. Something in their lives and times brought them to leave the order and familiarity of home, at least for a little while. They came to listen and to ask questions like: "What should we do?" We too, are asked to go into the wilderness of our lives where "the wild things are" in order to listen to the same prophetic voice: "what should we do?" Because God's Kingdom is within reach. The word of God is taking flesh!

Early Christianity was honed and shaped in the deserts of the Middle East. The desert fathers and mothers from the second and third centuries went to the wilderness so that they could strip from themselves all but the basics of life, to remove all the layers with which we encounter the self, in order to know who they really were. Today's Christianity is so often a turning away from that emptying dynamic; in fact is very consumerism-friendly Christianity.

In Luke's Gospel we find Mary, as the prototype of this season of hope: "Let it be done to me..." Mary's word is empowered by surrender. Only when we offer ourselves, our will, our hope and plans and our weakness to God do we become truly strong, for God lives and moves and breaths within our helplessness. Imagine the impact we might have upon our wounded, weary world if we could only leave with it a mark and message that would assure it, beyond all doubt, of this seemingly incredible reality: God with us! What shall you say? What shall you do? How shall you live, as an individual and as family, in order that you may assure just one other person of this life-changing, world-changing truth? God is with us... and this truth, if

we so allow it, can make all the difference in your life and mine during the year that awaits us.

Like night and day; Advent and Christmas are tied together, each needing the other. Advent leads us into the holy mystery of God's word incarnated: "The glory of God dwelling in our ordinary human experiences." The Christmas season proclaims that day when God joined the biological web of life in an intimate way by taking on a human life.

The infancy narratives which are called "complete gospels" because they contain the basic revelation of the full identity of Jesus and the way in which the revelation was shared with the poor (the shepherds) and the non-Jew (the Magi); will lead us to adore Jesus in the manger; where the life of God is offered to all as food to a hungry world.

The Gospel of John for the Christmas masses invites us to see in Jesus' life and death: friendship, intimacy, mutuality, service, faithful love – revealing God's desire and gift for the full flourishing of humanity, or in other words, salvation. John's meditation on God's supreme act of love in the Incarnation provides the heart of this vision: that the whole purpose of creation is for the Incarnation. Jesus' life fulfills God's eternal longing to become human, to share life and love in a unique and definitive way. God's overflowing love, the very life of the Trinity, is expressed in creation. Incarnation is God's first thought, the original design for all creation.

Hope, that like parents sharing their love in the life of a new child, our view of a gracious God sharing his divine life and love will dramatically change our celebration of Christmas, our day-by-day life, indeed our very understanding of God.

Isaiah 6:8, "Here I am Lord, send me", had for some time been my motto and when I realized that my birth date and ordination date were both 6/8, I took that as just one more sign that I was doing what I was supposed to do.

I want to thank everyone especially my wife, Virginia, for making my ministry so enjoyable. She is such a joy and a blessing to me. Our 54 years of marriage has passed all too quickly. Thank you all very, very much. I love you all.

**Some Points of Interest That Have taken Place During the Period of Deacon Mel's Service.**

After a request from Bishop Brown for information regarding the first Mass said in Idaho by Fr. DeSmet at Henry's Lake, Deacon Mel and Virginia took on the task of contacting people and after several months of writing letters and phone calls, they were able to have an historical marker installed at Henry's Lake commemorating the event.

While assigned as a Deacon to St. Paul's Parish, Mel worked with the Men's Club to raise money by having a Haunted

House for Halloween. Over fifty people worked on the event that brought in over eight thousand dollars. Deacon Mel stated that people said it was the "best" haunted house in the cities of Pocatello and Chubbuck. One Easter Vigil Mass, Deacon Mel and Fr. Anthony were the only clergy available for the celebration. Fr. Anthony said he could take care of the Mass and the homily if Deacon Mel did the baptisms. There were 23 baptisms that night with Deacon Mel as the presider. He stated that things worked out quite well.

After the death of Fr. Xavier in February of 2000, Bishop Driscoll appointed Deacon Mel as the administrator of St. Anthony Parish. Deacon Mel was grateful to the members of the parish who accepted him and the decisions he made of behalf of the parish during his appointment. Deacon Mel was instrumental in the restructuring and revitalization of the Boy Scout Troop 315 during the time of his appointment. He also made the arrangements for members of St. Anthony's Parish to go to a performance of the Phantom of the Opera. Fifty-six members of the parish went on a bus and everyone enjoyed the event.

The Blessing of the Animals each year was always one of Deacon Mel's favorite events. Many non-Catholics as well as parishioners brought their pets to be blessed each year. He stated that practically all the animals remained very still during the blessing.

**Deacon Mel Hardy Through the Eyes of His Daughter

I remember when my dad was going through the diaconate program. He didn't know if he was worthy of serving in such an important capacity. He really questioned his ability to be a spiritual leader when he reflected on the paths his children had all taken. As many parents struggle with the choices their children make, our parents were no different. When it came to our faith, all five of us had faltered in one way or another. I remember writing to him and telling him that we believed in him and his ability to lead. Yes, as children we caused disappointment, but our choices were not a direct response to the way we were raised; it was our own journey to experience life. Deep down we all had a great foundation of faith and it would just take time and maturity to embrace it.

I am so thankful God directed his path to move forward and become a deacon. There has been such a deep sense of pride to watch my dad do what he loved so much. His sermons were always uplifting and easy to relate to our current life events. When living in an area where you're outnumbered by other faiths, there are several times when others express their beliefs and it was sometimes a struggle to know what to say in response. It was great to be able to call dad up and ask questions about our faith, not only to settle my questions but also to enable me to explain to others what our faith teaches. His knowledge was always helpful and came in handy!

One moment that will always be held close to my heart is when my grandmother passed away (dad's mother). I will never forget the mass at St. Paul's when dad stood at the lectern and announced that his mother had

passed away that morning. He said the mass was being offered for her and showed great strength in doing it. I was amazed at how strong his faith was in knowing how God would embrace his mother and he continued expressing this faith as he served at her funeral mass.

The story of how dad chose to be a deacon is not complete without mentioning our mother. She is a pillar of strength that really made a difference in dad's decision to be a deacon and in the successes of our family. Mom was always supportive and stood by dad's side through everything.

Mom and Dad have both been great role models for our family and their examples through their marriage and commitment to the church will always be a blessing. We will miss seeing dad stand at the altar but the faith he has taught will enrich us and be carried on throughout our lives.

### Youth Ministry

Eighteen dedicated men and women from the Eastern and Northern deaneries spent two very full days of training in a process for growing effective youth ministry. The training was based on tested strategies and a comprehensive vision for youth ministry. Evangelization and Relational Outreach were the topics of the second training phase. Frank Mercadante, *Cultivation Ministries*, led the discussions in the dynamics of evangelizing youth toward making them disciples of Christ. "When Jesus called us to make disciples, he meant the whole process of leading people to conversion, establishing them in their faith, and training them to make an impact on the world. Discipleship is a complete cycle of Christian development."

Mercadante shared "that making disciples can be likened to the cultivation process. It begins with preparing the soil. We till the ground, remove rocks, fertilize the plot, and irrigate the land. After the soil is worked, we gently scatter the seed, water it each night, chase away the menacing crows, and hope for germination. In time, a tiny bud bursts forth and we find ourselves with the task of nurturing it towards maturity and fruitfulness. As the plants gradually mature, they begin to yield the anticipated fruit."

Plans for an effective youth ministry are a priority at Holy Spirit. Anything that is worth doing is worth doing well. For very effective youth ministry to flourish and grow at Holy Spirit, a great many prayers are needed. Plans are being grown for an intercessory prayer program for each and every youth of Holy Spirit. A strategic plan will be developed to provide a comprehensive plan of faith formation. A "Mission" statement will be developed by the designated planning team. Focus Result Areas will determine the key areas to fulfill the "Mission" that meet the needs of youth at Holy Spirit.

Intercessory prayer will guide efforts toward establishing programming for activities, events, methods and approaches to effectively communicate the Good News of Jesus to all teens of our community.

## Capital Campaign for New Church, School Enters Next Phase

After a successful initial fund-raising effort that netted \$1.646 million, the capital campaign to build the new Holy Spirit church and school has entered a second phase. The ultimate goal is to raise enough money to begin construction on the church and joint church-school infrastructure by spring of 2008.

“Our feasibility study initially identified the potential to raise between \$1.5 and \$2 million during the first phase of the capital campaign,” said Father Enrique Terriquez, Holy Spirit pastor. “So we feel that raising over \$1.6 million was a very successful effort. We want to thank everyone involved in the campaign – those who made phone calls, those who served on the campaign committee, and most of all, those who donated to the campaign. We received pledges and donations of \$80,000 in the final weekend of the campaign. We are very grateful for all the support.”

The campaign committee met shortly after the end of the first phase of the capital campaign to discuss how to keep the fundraising momentum going, and how to reach the goal of breaking ground on new facilities by spring of 2008. They developed an action plan that includes:

--Developing ongoing fundraising efforts, including reminding people of the tax advantages of giving before the end of the year, encouraging people to donate to the campaign in the name of friends or loved ones as Christmas gifts, coordinating fundraising efforts with other church groups, and keeping parishioners aware of progress in the fundraising effort.


---Meeting with the architects and the liturgical consultant to determine if there are ways to cut the estimated cost of the church and school through design changes, while maintaining the overall goal of a church that can seat 900 people, with overflow capacity for 1,100.

--Meeting with Diocesan officials to determine exactly how much funding must still be raised before construction can begin.

---Reminding parishioners that initial contributions to the capital campaign will be spent on infrastructure, such as roads, water and sewer lines, electrical, etc., which will be shared by both the new church and the new school facility.

In addition to the \$1.6 million raised during the capital campaign, the parish has about \$1.4 million available from the sale of its property on Bench Road, and has collateral available in the form of the St. Paul, St. Anthony and St. Joseph’s property. St. Joseph’s will remain within the parish, but the other two chapels and the St. Anthony’s school property will eventually be sold. The current church design is estimated at about \$10 million, and the Diocese requires that 70 percent of that cost be in hand in cash, pledges or property before construction can begin.

“We are going to continue to work very hard until we reach our goal of breaking ground in the spring of 2008,” said Father Enrique. “That means looking at the design of both the church and the school to see if we can reduce costs, looking for other options for funding, and continuing to rely upon the generosity of our parishioners to give to the cause.”
