

Merry Christmas! Being that you are reading this newsletter during the *official* Christmas season the greeting is appropriate. While most everyone else is scrambling to remove any sign or visage of Christmas we, as Catholics, are finally celebrating. For twelve

days we rejoice in the birth of Christ while many say they are recovering from the holidays. Some may admire us for our endurance while others wrinkle their foreheads in confusion but, no matter their reaction, we are invited to rejoice in joy.

It is interesting to me how our American culture will reflect on and celebrate certain events longer than others. When a pro sports team wins a world championship their home city celebrates that win for weeks. Not only that, they are invested in supporting the team for the entire season leading up to the championship whereas Christmas . . . *well* . . . Too frequently Christmas is seen as something to be survived as apposed to anticipated, celebrated and lived. So here is my challenge: Let us properly celebrate the birth of Jesus during the Christmas season.

The truths of Christmas, just as those in Easter, shape the entire Christian experience. Our journey through the liturgical year lacks a foundation without our remembering of God's fulfilled promise in Jesus. He is the Messiah! He is the anointed whose birth announced a new history for all humankind! He is to be the reconciler of humanity and God! He is to be the new and everlasting High Priest! He is to be forever Emmanuel – "God is With Us"! The birth of Jesus Christ is the culmination of God's self revelation, meaning that there is never to be a fuller understanding of who God is beyond Jesus and his ministry.

The first coming of Christ is only part of our Christmas understanding. As Christians we form our lives around the twofold coming of Christ. The first is, as we know, Jesus' birth in Nazareth and his com-

ing as Messiah. The second is His coming again as the Lord of Glory at the end of days. The twofold comings of Christ are events that should properly form our lives as Christians. We are called to live differently because Christ was born. A new end is offered to all of humanity, one that culminates in the eternal presence of God instead of everlasting death. The reality that Christ will come again to gather all things to himself challenges us to be prepared for we do not know the day or the time.

Christmas brings us to remember the beginning and anticipate the end as we live in the middle. As we live and pray between the two, Christ comes to us in many unexpected and powerful ways. Our sacramental celebrations help to usher in the reign of God and bring about his final coming in Glory. Christ's coming to the world is more than a day, (or twelve days for us Catholics). It is an event that turned human history and leads it to a new end. Brothers and sisters we need to be mindful of that end in all aspects of our lives. Our lives between the two comings of Christ are not a time to rest but rather a time to grow. Christ is in our midst, and we will see him if we remember and anticipate.

This year, baptized youth (16 years old by May 2007 and older) will be eligible for Confirmation. We are pleased to announce that Bill O'Brien will be teaching the Confirmation classes for the teens. We need a parent or interested adult to help Bill with the classes, if you would like to help please contact at Diane Stinger 244-2622.

The classes for the teens will start sometime in February and run for 6 weeks. There will also be a one day Sunday retreat after the classes are completed but before Confirmation. Confirmation will be at the end of April or beginning of May 2007. Youth candidates, please be thinking of a sponsor and ask that person before the January meeting. (See below for Sponsor requirements) A letter will be sent out to all eligible youth of the Holy Spirit Catholic Community before the parent/youth candidate meeting in January. Cost for supplies and program will be \$30.00.

### CONFIRMATION SPONSORS

Dear Confirmation Candidates:

Confirmation can be a great experience and hopefully you've thought a lot about what this sacrament means and how the Holy Spirit will affect your life. You'll be required to have a sponsor—someone who will guide you and share the story of faith with you. A good sponsor will make this process a little easier and even more fun. A sponsor could be one of your baptismal godparents. If you cannot use your baptismal godparents you will need to choose a new sponsor.

Here is some advice for you if you are looking for a sponsor. You are looking for someone you trust, whose faith you admire and who will be there for you. The requirements for sponsors are that they be confirmed Catholics, at least 16 years old and practicing members of the Church, while not being your parents. This means you can choose a relative, friend or someone from your Catholic Community as your sponsor. Your sponsor will be asked to spend time with you on various activities as you prepare for Confirmation. They will also be asked to participate in the ceremony.

### DO YOU NEED OTHER SACRAMENTS BEFORE BEING CONFIRMED?

If you are a youth who wants to be confirmed but needs the Sacraments of The Eucharist and Reconciliation please contact Ann Hysell (232-1196) or Diane Stinger (244-2622) as soon as possible to make arrangements for receiving these Sacraments before you are confirmed.

### ADULT CONFIRMATION CLASSES

### IRA Rollover Gifts A Special Gift Opportunity

On August 17, 2006, the President signed into law the Pension Protection Act of 2006. The Pension Protection Act will allow individuals over age 70½ make tax-free donations of up to \$100,000 from their IRAs directly to a qualified public charity for 2006 and 2007 only.

Individuals who are looking to make charitable contributions may prefer to use IRA money to make their contributions so that normally taxable distributions from their IRAs can be made tax-free. The gift qualifies for the individual's IRA minimum distribution and could substantially lower taxes. This opportunity will only last until December 31, 2007.

### Faith Festival By Ann Hysell

We continue with the third in the series on the theme, "A Year of Prayer". "How Do We Pray?" concentrates on the way we pray in the Catholic Tradition.

These forms flow from our liturgical traditions and are rooted in Scripture, especially in the Psalms and prayers of Christ. "We bless, we ask, we intercede, we give thanks, and we praise God". This excerpt is taken from the study guide to be used at the January 28, 2007 Faith Festival at St. Paul Chapel, 1:30 PM.

Scott Pearhill will facilitate this session. Scott has conducted a seminar on the "Centering Prayer" form of prayer at the Monastery of the Ascension. Pearhill is a former facilitator for the Loyola University extension program, a course of graduate studies for lay ecclesial ministers.

A potato bar lunch will be prepared and served by the catechumens of our community. Come meet the men, women and children who hope to join us as full members of the Church at Easter. Their participation in the meal is one way they become familiar with the activities that prepare them for parish life.

If you have not yet come to a Faith Festival you should give it a try. We begin with a light lunch at 1:30, lasting for about 30 minutes. Then we break into age level learning sessions. Adults and young adults, teens, and children all have lessons on the same subject, Prayer, suited to their learning level.

\$2,350.00 to be reimbursed by parish savings for computer network payment.

Copies of the approved Income & Expense statement for November are in the back of each Chapel.

The first payment on the new computer system was made in November in the amount of \$2,350.00. There will be an annual payment for the next four years. The money is taken from the parish savings account.

November income was down a bit from October but still good. We are about \$5530.00 over last year's year -to-date regular income. We also collected \$950.00 at the Thanksgiving Day Mass that went to St Vincent de Paul. Even with the Capital Campaign, our ordinary contributions remain strong.

Statements for the pledges to the Capital Campaign

started going out in December. They show your pledge amount and the amounts that have already been paid. There will be a return envelope with each statement for you to use for your payments. You can put them in the collection basket, drop them off at the office, or mail them. Also please remember to write New Bldg Fund in the memo box on your check.

To date we have received \$1,714,298.00 in pledges from 401 families. We continue to receive new pledges, so if you haven't had a chance to pledge it's not too late.

Please remember that the money donated to the Capital Campaign is ***NOT*** used to maintain any part of the day to day expenses of our three chapels. The weekly/monthly contributions that you always donate are still needed to pay our regular expenses and keep the properties maintained. Money for the New Church goes into a different savings account from our regular parish checking/savings account. Please do not put your pledges into your regular contribution envelopes unless it is on a separate check. Thanks.

**Wendy's High School Heisman Award Winner**

The Wendy's High School Heisman Award is a national competition that starts by the administrators (i.e. vice principal, counselors) nominating a boy and girl from their school. The 2 students fill out a huge application form. The application includes an academic, athletic, and community service sections for your freshman through junior year. The academic includes GPA, class rank, club/organizations you've been involved in and how many hours/AP classes you have taken. Athletic had everything from awards to records for every sport you have done and in what you lettered. Community Service asked about the different organizations you helped with and the number of hours you spent volunteering freshman, sophomore and junior year. At the end were 2 student narratives; one telling them about yourself and the other describing an obstacle you have had to overcome.

I have above a 4.0 and am ranked 1st in my class. Over 3 years I've taken 10 Honors and AP classes and been involved in SEAC (Students for Environmental Awareness Club), Outdoor club, Yearbook (of which I am co-editor this year), and Junior Civitan (which I was vice president last year and president this year). I played varsity soccer my freshman year, varsity track freshman through junior year, and Cross Country sophomore through junior year. I was a state medalist in track my sophomore & junior year and in Cross Country my junior year. Junior year I was cross country co-captain and Most Outstanding Athlete. All three years I got the Outstanding Individual Scholastic Award for Cross Country and Track. I've put in somewhere around 300 service hours since freshman year. Some of the organizations I've been involved in are Junior Civitan, the Franciscan Sister's Oregon Trail Reenactment, Habitat for Humanity, Life Skills Training, Church Youth Group and Relay for Life.

The first round is a committee deciding on the top 10 people (5 boys & 5 girls) from each state. Then, it is narrowed down to one boy and one girl as the state winners. I was chosen in the top 10 for Idaho and went on to win the state. From there a different committee reviewed the winners from each state classified into 6 different regions throughout the country, but that was as far as I made it. The regional winners went onto a national competition and the national winners will be chosen on December 10th.

Our diocesan newspaper, the IDAHO CATHOLIC REGISTER, is an important tool we use right in our own homes to help us deal with complexities of life and make Christ-centered decisions.

The IDAHO CATHOLIC REGISTER has much to offer: local, national and world church news, diocesan happenings, Bishop Michael Driscoll's teachings and reflections, articles and analysis on events, trends and issues of great concern to Catholics today, letters to the editor, advice on living as Christians in our work and family life, inspirational features and columns to help us on our faith journey.

It is the goal of the Bishop that every parishioner receives the Idaho Catholic Register. In an effort to reach this goal, our parish is charged for 556 subscriptions whether we collect the cost of the subscription or not. We ask everyone who is currently receiving the ICR to prayerfully consider helping us put this Catholic resource in every possible household in our parish.

If you have not yet paid for your Idaho Catholic Register subscription, it is not too late. The price for the ICR subscription is only \$17 a year for 22 issues that arrive in your mailbox twice a month. You can put your check, made out to the parish and marked "ICR subscription", in the collection basket, drop it by or mail it to the office.

If you cannot afford to pay for your subscription, please call the parish office. We still want you to receive the paper. On the other hand, if you can afford to pay an additional subscription, you can help provide the paper for another parish family.



### Coffee Hour Schedule Includes Parish Ministries, Organizations and School

During the past few months, some of our parish ministries such as Prayer Group, Legion of Mary, Altar Servers,

Landings, Neighborhood Ministry and Religious Education; organizations such as HSCCW, Pastoral Council and Boy Scouts; and Holy Spirit Catholic School have been providing Coffee Hour following some of the Masses. One of the fruits of our Fall Ministry Fair was the eagerness of many of our ministries, organizations and individual families to sign up for the Coffee Hours. Many other ministries such as RCIA, Music, Befriender, Youth Ministry and Prison Ministry have volunteered to be scheduled during the New Year.

Including our many ministries, organizations and school in the Coffee Hour schedule will give the parishioners an opportunity to learn more about the ministry or organization and meet the members of their groups. This provides a chance for each group to inform the parish of their activities and plans for the future. Both Councils of the Knights of Colum-

bus have already been providing the Seminarian Pancake Breakfasts at each of the chapels for many years and now we have the ability to involve all the other ministries and organizations that our parish has to offer.

Each ministry, organization or family will provide the donuts or other goodies, set up and make the coffee for the Coffee Hours following the Sunday morning Masses at the chapel in which they are scheduled. Instruction sheets for making coffee at each of the chapels will be provided. The Coffee Hour schedule will also include individual families at each of the chapels. A donation basket will be set out at each Coffee Hour to help the groups or families with the cost of the donuts, etc. The coffee and paper goods will be provided by the parish. The Coffee Hours that will be scheduled are: St. Paul after the 9 am Mass, St. Joseph after the 8 am and 11 am Masses (we ask that groups or individuals consider taking both of these Masses when they are scheduled at St. Joseph's) and St. Anthony after the 10 am Mass.

Many groups such as the Pastoral Council, Legion of Mary and Holy Spirit School said they found it to be a rewarding experience and an excellent way to share their ministry with a larger number of parishioners.

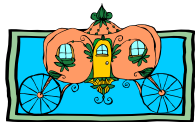
