



During the last week of January the priests of our Diocese gathered for our annual clergy assembly. A major component of these meetings for the past two years has been the building of unity among the presbyterate. We are a group that spans numerous decades and grew up in different social and ecclesial times.

This being said, it is obvious that we have different understandings of the priesthood, ministry and Church. You may have this experience in your own families as you look at how your parents or grandparents approach the Church differently from you and your children. Religion and politics can generally lead to great clashes of opinion and the same is true for priests where our vocation involves both ministry and governance.

My experience of the 2007 assembly, which I believe was not unique unto myself, was incredibly positive. The fruit of our collective work to unite as common believers and priests was quite evident. We share, listen, laugh, eat, play cards and pray together in a way all together different from two years ago. Whereas before we saw each other as “old”, “young”, “liberal”, “conservative,” etc., we are now seeing each other as brother and friend. So much of our prejudice that prevented us from listening and understanding each other is gone. No longer is our brother priest a threat, he is simply a man living out his vocation.

I am so grateful to say we enjoy being with each other and share a common desire to build our ties of fraternity.

Perhaps the greatest work of this past assembly was found in a presentation called “A Generational Approach to Understanding Presbyterates”. Within this, our keynote Dominic Perra, presented a four generational ecclesiastical model of our current presbyterate. The four categories were *pre-Vatican*, *Vatican II*, *post-Vatican II*, and *Jubilee priests*. The premise within these generational groups is that each one was affected by social and national events and well as the ecclesiastical environments in their respective seminaries. Often, the outcome of these events led to a very different understanding of church and priesthood than the previous generation.

Although I do not have the space to present the different characteristics of each group here, it may suffice to say that each group was formed in the seminary with different influences. The most important outcome of the presentation was that we were able to understand why the members of other generational groups approach ministry,

the priesthood and the Church as they do. As groups we were even able to joke about our structures and those of the other generations. Through our work in this session our various approaches were no longer personal attacks to other groups but simply our way of being a priest. We locked in on our shared characteristics and dialogued how we can be more collaborative and supportive in ministry.

I share all of this for two reasons, both of which are connected. As a Catholic body right now we risk becoming more polarized into groups or camps. I do not mean just our Holy Spirit Community but as Catholics in America. We risk falling into greater and greater divisions if we lock ourselves in respective camps. Therefore, if you see “conservatives” as trying to turn back the Church and reject Vatican II, I challenge you to seek understanding of their views. I promise you, they are not trying to turn back the clock as much as they are simply trying to reintroduce many things that have been put aside or forgotten. If you see the “liberals” as having the sole agenda of destroying the institutional church, I invite you to trust that they are genuinely striving to build the kingdom of God.

As the priests of Idaho, we would not be in the place we are in now if we had demanded that others agree with and become like us. In our journey we did not have to abandon our spiritualities or ministries to grow in unity and affection. Neither will you. However, we did have to share a dialogue and start the collective walk on the path to unity. Every Sunday we gather around one universal table to share the Body and Blood of Christ. That we are there reveals something of great value; we love God and celebrate his gifts. Christ has already united us in himself, therefore let us cooperate with this gift of grace and strive evermore to become “one body, one spirit in Christ”.

Monthly statements for the pledges to the Capital were mailed on February 6th. Some of you have paid prior to receiving your statement and they crossed in the mail. If you have already made your payment don't worry about the statement.

There are a few people putting their pledge amount on the same check as their regular contribution. Please write two separate checks, as they are for two separate funds and two separate deposits. Thanks.

As of 02-09-07 we have received \$1,739,883 in pledges from 418 families. We continue to receive new pledges, so if you haven't had a chance to pledge, it's not too late.

The Idaho Catholic Appeal is starting on March 4th, 2007. The overall theme for the appeal is **BUILDING THE BODY OF CHRIST IN IDAHO**, and the sub theme for the 2007 appeal is **Charity, Care, Compassion**. All money received goes directly to the Diocese. The BIG Picture

A Status Update on the Building Campaign

This insert is part of an ongoing effort on the part of the Core Committee and the Parish Council to keep Holy Spirit Parish up to date on the building campaign – and to remember why we’re doing this. First, a look back:

Why are we doing this?

There are five major reasons why we’re moving forward with a new church: 1) There is a significant probability we will have only one priest to serve Holy Spirit Parish in the near future, which limits the number of Masses that can be offered on weekends; 2) The diocese would like us to help assist in the priest shortage, as defined in the Vitality Study, by reconfiguring our facilities so that it can more equitably assign priests across the diocese; 3) Our current buildings are aging and are expensive to maintain; 4) A Single church and jointly located facilities will bring together all Catholics from around the area, offering many benefits; 5) We need to begin a long-term plan to accommodate future generations and potential growth within the parish.

Where are we now?

The decisions that have been made so far have been the result of a very participative, deliberative process that has involved, literally, hundreds of parishioners over several years. Decisions that have been made include: 1) St. Joseph’s Church, which is on the Historical Registry, will remain a part of the parish, although it is unknown right now how it will be utilized once the new church is built (daily Masses? Weddings? Funerals?); 2) St. Joseph’s School has been sold; 3) Surplus vacant property on Bench Road has been sold for \$1.4 million; 4) 181 acres of land have been purchased, with part serving as the site for the new church and school (approx. 80-90 acres) and part to be re-sold; 5) Preliminary architectural plans were completed in 2006; 6) Initial capital campaign completed, with pledges of \$1.74 million to date.

What Issues Do We Have Now?

The diocese requires that we have 70 percent of the cost of new construction in hand in the form of cash, pledges or collateral property. Very rough cost estimates for the new church, as originally designed and related infrastructure is \$11 million, and for the school is another \$7 million. We do not

have the 70 percent needed to cover the costs of either right now.

So What Do We Do Now?

Our goal is to begin construction by the spring of 2008. With construction costs going up every year, the sooner we start work, the less the final product will cost. We are working with the architects to make adjustments in the designs to significantly reduce the cost of the church and the school, while maintaining facilities that will sufficiently serve the community for the foreseeable future. We are working to gain the maximum benefit of existing assets, like the St. Paul’s property, which we are going to have appraised for potential sale. We are also evaluating the best way to increase the value of the excess Gathe Road Property, through annexation into the city, and completing roads and utilities to the site.

Keeping You Informed

We know that the possibility of putting St. Paul’s property up for sale upsets many parishioners. It is important to note that getting an appraisal on that property will likely take three months or more, and there is no way to estimate how long it will take to sell a very specialized commercial property like a church. There is also the possibility that an extension that would allow us to continue to use St. Paul’s until the new church is available could be worked out with any potential buyer. But we have got to move forward with the process so we can better understand what the property is worth and how much money we have available to use toward construction.

In an effort to keep you better informed, we will be placing a coupon in the bulletin each week, beginning this week, asking you to submit your questions, concerns or suggestions. We will respond to your input on a periodic basis, in the bulletin, on our web site (<http://www.hscc.org>), and in the monthly newsletter.

We appreciate all your support and we understand there will be aspects of this process which will cause all of you concern. We will try to minimize that concern wherever possible, while continuing to move forward with this very important work. Remember, the foundation we lay will be enjoyed by future generations of Holy Spirit parishioners – much as we enjoy the chapels and school that exist today.

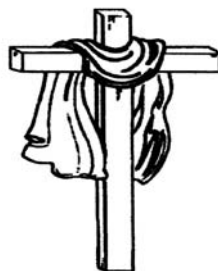
