



## “Vox Populi, Vox Dei”

“People’s Voice is God’s Voice.” This is an old saying in the life of the early church that came to my mind exactly in Latin. Probably to remind me, of how old this saying is and probably how much we have forgotten about it. History tells us that listening to the people has not always been

the practice of the rulers of the world, including the church. It was with surprise and joy that, we who participated at the Diocesan Convocation this past June in Boise, heard our Bishop not only announcing, but decreeing that he wants to hear everybody in order to have a Pastoral Plan that will serve better the people of God in Idaho. “All at the table,” was the Bishop’s best way to appeal to everybody’s participation. Let everybody pull up a chair and join me, Bishop remarked.

When Jesus was rebuking the Scribes and Pharisees for not accepting him as the Messiah of God, even though they have seen the miracles he performed, he told them that they were not capable of reading “the sign of the times” in him and his works, even though they were experts in predicting the weather through the signs given by mother nature.

Three years ago when an undersea earthquake off the coast of Indonesia set in motion a series of Tsunamis that killed 275,000 people and left thousands more homeless, the victims learned to be detached from things in the most catastrophic manner possible – involuntarily. Two years ago this month, when a hurricane swept away the lives and homes and belongings of thousands along the U.S Gulf Coast, a similarly difficult lesson was forever ingrained on the southern psyche. A few months ago, in April, when a cruise ship sank within minutes near the Greek island of Santorini, the 1,600 passengers who had to abandon the ship in haste watched as all their belongings went down. Such losses are hard teachers and those who survive them, usually admit that as a result, they have been forever changed. Values are rethought, priorities are adjusted, and people become more precious than property.

What prompted our Bishop to announce with such a conviction that we need to hear everybody? We have not had an earthquake or a tornado or a disaster of magnitude proportions to shake us and say that our lives will not be the same? I think there is no need of an extraordinary shocking event to make us reflect seriously in the meaning of our lives.

More even, I see that the best challenge is to hear God’s voice in the everyday events as God always is present, and promised not to leave us orphans.

“Proclaiming the Good News until the end of time,” I believed was the driving force that made our Bishop make this remarkable and exciting appeal. He felt the responsibility to listen to God’s people in the diocese in order to accomplish his mission. This may be the once in a lifetime opportunity to speak up, to come forward and say: “This is what we need in our journey of faith.”

We have already begun soliciting opinions in our parish through our different organizations. It will be impossible to approach each one of you, but do not expect anyone to come to you. Feel free to express your opinion regarding what the diocese or the parish needs to do in order to be more effective. Write them down, send them to me and I’ll send them to Boise who in kind will compile, organize, collate them, etc., and then Bishop will come to us to talk about all of our input.

Do not let this opportunity go by. It is our chance, our obligation more even, to “come to the table.” The banquet is an image of the kingdom of God that is already inaugurated in Christ and through Christ. He is in our midst. After a long winter of frozen voices, it comes now the Spring-Time for a renewal in the life of our diocese.

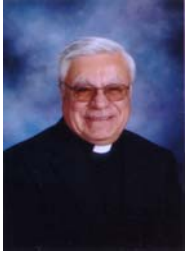

## “Vox Populi, Vox Dei”



“La voz del pueblo es la voz de Dios.” Es un viejo dicho de la iglesia que vino a mí precisamente en Latín. Probablemente para recordar cuán antiguo es el mismo y cómo lo hemos echado a un lado. A través de la historia vemos que no ha sido práctica de los gobernantes el escuchar a su pueblo, como tampoco de la iglesia. Fue con gran sorpresa y alegría, que quienes participamos en la Reunión de la Diócesis de Boise en el mes de Junio, escuchamos a nuestro Obispo proclamar que desea escuchar a su pueblo para así lograr un Plan Pastoral que ayude a mejorar el pueblo de Dios en Idaho. “Todos en la mesa,” es la forma en que el Obispo decidió exhortar a todos a participar. “Que todos tomen su lugar en la mesa y me acompañen,” dijo el Obispo.

Cuando Jesús reclamaba a los Escribas y Fariseos por no aceptarlo como el Mesías, aún luego de ver los milagros que este realizó, les dijo que no eran capaces de reconocer “los signos de los tiempos” en él y en su obra, aún cuando eran expertos en predecir el tiempo leyendo los signos que les proporcionaba la madre naturaleza.

Cuando hace tres años un terremoto en la costa de Indonesia provocó una serie de Tsunamis que cobraron la vida de 275,000 personas, dejando a miles sin hogar, las víctimas aprendieron de manera catastrófica e involuntaria a desligarse de sus posesiones materiales. Hace dos años, un huracán cobró la vida y pertenencias de miles de personas a través de la Costa del Golfo de los Estados Unidos, una lección igualmente difícil que marcó la vida espiritual del sur de los Estados Unidos. En el pasado mes de abril, cuando un barco crucero se hundió cerca de la isla griega de Santorini, 1,600 pasajeros rescatados observaron como todas sus pertenencias se hundían en el mar. Pérdidas de tal magnitud ofrecen una dura lección, y quienes las sobreviven aseguran que sus vidas son cambiadas para siempre. Los valores se reevalúan, las prioridades se ajustan, y el ser humano pasa a ser una joya mucho más valiosa que las posesiones materiales.

¿Qué llevó a nuestro Obispo a anunciar con tal convicción que necesitamos escuchar al pueblo? Localmente no hemos tenido un terremoto, tornado, o desastres de proporciones tales que nos estremezcan y cambien nuestras vidas para

siempre. Creo que no es necesario vivir un evento tan extraordinario para reflexionar seriamente sobre el significado de nuestras vidas. Más aún, creo que el mejor reto es el escuchar la voz de Dios en los eventos del día a día en los que él siempre está presente, y en los que prometió no dejarnos huérfanos.

“Proclamar la Buena Nueva hasta el final de los tiempos,” es probablemente la fuerza que ha movido a nuestro Obispo a realizar esta petición. El tiene la responsabilidad de escuchar al pueblo de Dios en la Diócesis para poder realizar su misión; esta puede ser la gran oportunidad que se presenta una vez en la vida para dejarse oír, hablar, y compartir; “esto es lo que necesitamos en nuestro camino de fé.”

Hemos comenzado a solicitar opiniones en nuestra Parroquia a través de diferentes organizaciones. Debido a que sería imposible contactarlos a todos personalmente, siéntanse en la libertad de expresar sus opiniones sobre qué debe hacer la Diócesis y la Parroquia para ser más efectiva. Escríbalo en un papel y hágamelo llegar para yo entonces enviarlo a Boise. Una vez ellos tengan la información organizada el Obispo se dirigirá a nosotros para hablar sobre nuestras ideas.

No dejen pasar esta oportunidad, ya que es nuestra obligación “sentarnos todos a la mesa”. El banquete es una imagen del reino de Dios, quien está entre nosotros. Tras un largo invierno de voces congeladas, esta es nuestra primavera para renovar la vida de nuestra Diócesis.

Que no quede una sola silla vacía!

## Finance Corner

The Finance Council met in May & June to finalize the 2007-2008 budget. It was completed and given to the Parish council. The Parish Council approved the budget.

The 2006-2007 budget was finalized and a copy was sent to the Diocese in August.

**New Building Fund:** Income for the fiscal year 06-07 was \$2,069,319.04 and expenses were \$1,119,532.06. Expenses included the purchase of land, BCDM architects initial draft, Trinity Consultants for the Capital Campaign, appraisal of St. Paul's Chapel and office supplies for mailings, fundraisers etc. As of July 31, 2007 the total in savings for the new church and school was \$1,301,867.46.

**St Joseph's Renovation Fund:** Interest income for the fiscal year 06-07 was \$2,812.50. Expenses were \$1,401.07 for the repair of the North side door.

The Idaho Catholic Appeal was down this year. Of the \$101,665.00 goal, only \$63,494.00 in donations were received. Thanks to the 277 families who donated. I realize with the Capital Campaign, budgets may have been tight, but please remember that the money collected for the Idaho Catholic Appeal goes directly to the Diocese and is used to support many programs for our parish, seminarians, and Catholic Charities.

It's never too late to sign up for Electronic Fund Transfers for your monthly contribution. EFT's are deducted on the 15<sup>th</sup> of the month from your checking or savings accounts and will show on your monthly statement from the bank. If you would like to sign up, please fill out the enclosed form and return it to me. You can put it in the collection basket, mail it, or drop it off at the office.

## Progress continues on the efforts to develop a new church and school, on two different fronts.

Moving forward with the building plan, our architect has hired an engineering firm to develop a plan for how best to build our infrastructure (road, water and sewer). The engineering firm is the same company working with Trail Creek Development, which is the land south of our school and school site. We hope

that by working together with the developer, we can share some infrastructure and reduce costs to both parties. We anticipate receiving an infrastructure plan from the engineer firm something late this summer.

On another front, the Diocese is also moving forward with efforts to have the church and school property annexed into the city of Pocatello. A list of all property owners with 300 feet of the Holy Spirit property was compiled and submitted to the city. The city will contact those property owners and set up two public hearings on the proposal this fall. The Core Committee which is overseeing the building plans still hopes we can break ground on the infrastructure work this fall, although selection of a contractor and the beginning of physical work at the site may take until next spring.



## Continúa el progreso y los esfuerzos destinados al desarrollo de la nueva iglesia y la nueva escuela.

El arquitecto ha contratado una firma de ingenieros para desarrollar un plan de construcción de la infraestructura, (carreteras, agua, y sistema de alcantarillas). Estos son los mismos ingenieros trabajando con 'Trail Creek Development', el terreno que se encuentra al sur del lugar donde estará ubicada la nueva escuela. Esperamos que al trabajar juntos podamos reducir el

costo para ambas partes. Anticipamos recibir el plan de infraestructura de los ingenieros en algún momento a fines del verano.

Por otro lado, la Diócesis de Boise realiza esfuerzos para lograr anexar la nueva propiedad con la ciudad de Pocatello. Se redactó una lista con los nombres de los dueños de las propiedades ubicadas a una distancia de 300 pies del nuevo terreno. La ciudad se comunicará con los dueños de estas propiedades para llevar a cabo dos vistas públicas en el otoño, sobre dicha propuesta. El comité a cargo de las nuevas facilidades espera poder comenzar el proyecto de construcción en el otoño, a pesar de que la selección del contratista y el comienzo de la construcción física podría tardar hasta la próxima primavera.
