



A New Year of Possibilities

Happy New Year! Another year begins again the cycle of new possibilities. For some people, after weeks of holiday feasting, a new year marks the beginning of passionate promises to start fresh on health concerns, diet, more exercise, an end to a bad habit. Others recognize it as the time to collect tax papers and receipts. Students and teachers begin a fresh semester.

For the church, the New Year continues the cycle of Gospel readings that started with the first Sunday of Advent; this year we read from Mathew. “A Gospel writer who is struggling to bring alive...the meaning of life, teaching, and person of Jesus; the Jesus who proclaimed the Kingdom of God.” Matthew’s Gospel passages will help us journey throughout this year into the mystery of Jesus Christ, whose Messiah ship was the longed fulfillment of hope, the Jesus whose death and resurrection offered all ... the promise of new life.

January is a good time to reflect on the mystery of baptism. Baptism is the sacrament at the root of the entire mystery of life in Christ, yet it has long been undervalued, taken for granted. Baptism is seldom the focus of Catholic identity; in popular understanding it has been defined as no more than the remedy for original sin, a proper rite of pastoral care for infants. Yet our inattention to the mystery of baptism may well underlie the diminished sense of church. Baptism is above all else the intentional entering of humans into graced relationships, truly divine and truly human.

Epiphany is a January feast, and Epiphany and baptism have ancient connections. Epiphany was once a day for baptisms, which now in the Roman Rite is reserved for the Easter Vigil, except in the case of infants. The Eastern Church celebrates Epiphany with a nod to the Magi, calling epiphany instead “the Jordan feast” Epiphany is the day for them to celebrate the baptism of Jesus and, by implication, the church’s participation in the baptismal mystery. So it is important to recall the pri-

mary manifestation, the major “epiphany” or showing of divine mystery that happened at the Jordan.

We baptized, are welcomed through Christ within the mysterious relationship of divine-human communion by our God who is an indivisible life-giving communion. So it is important to point out that the mystery of our faith is a mystery of relationship, a mystery of relationship and communion that is at once Trinitarian, ecclesial and ministerial.

The event of baptism does not stand in isolation; the making of Christians is a lifelong process that involves everybody. The fuller truth is that each Sunday’s Eucharistic liturgy continues the initiation of the baptized into the great epiphany of communion in Christ with its Abba, through the power of the Holy Spirit. At the end we are sent to “love and serve the Lord and one another” Worship, mission and a life of prayer are all integral parts of the mystery.

John the Baptist was a man on a mission. So was Jesus Christ. They both wanted the message of God’s reign proclaimed to the world. Hope, the Feast of Epiphany will be a good occasion to reflect on the fullness of what has been manifested both at the Jordan and to the Magi. “The mystery of relationships and communion as our identity with God and one another.”

Update on Holy Spirit Building Process

There have been several developments in the new church and school building process, chief among them approval from the Diocese to place the St. Paul's chapel and rectory up for sale. The Diocese will be notifying Realtors after the first of the year of the availability of the St. Paul's property. The chapel and rectory were previously appraised at a combined value of about \$1.1 million.

"We know many parishioners have very deep ties to St. Paul's," said Father Enrique Terriquez, pastor of Holy Spirit Catholic Community. "Many have grown up in the church, received First Communion there, been married there, and had family members buried from that chapel. We intend to find a suitable buyer for the property who will make appropriate use of the building. Then, we intend to carry out the rituals that will allow us to bring an appropriate closure to the building as a Catholic chapel."

A transition committee headed by Kellie Hall will begin the work of inventorying all of the items in the chapel, and determining what should be kept for possible future use at the new church, what should be returned to parishioners who may have donated materials, and what can be discarded. The committee will also begin planning the various rituals that will take place once the chapel is sold to help parishioners remember key moments in their lives that took place there, and then move forward emotionally.

It is unknown how long it will take to find a suitable buyer for a specialized property like St. Paul's. Once it is sold, a new Mass schedule will be developed to accommodate all Holy Spirit parishioners in the St. Anthony and St. Joseph's chapels. Other arrangements will be made for funeral dinners and other activities that are currently held at St. Paul's.

"We know there will be some inconvenience once St.

Paul's sells," said Father Enrique. "We'll do the best we can to make our parishioners as comfortable as possible. The positive side is that we will continue to bring the Holy Spirit family closer together as we consolidate facilities."

The building committee has accomplished several goals over the last year. They have worked with the architect to scale back plans for the new church building, thereby significantly reducing the estimated cost of the facility without sacrificing the necessary seating capacity. They have received a report from an engineering company providing options for installing infrastructure (water, sewer and roads), and cost estimates. They have also decided at this point to just install the water, sewer and roads necessary for the needs of the new church and school. The infrastructure could be expanded later to include the excess property Holy Spirit owns near the new church site, if it's determined that will make the property more valuable for resale. Holy Spirit's Building Fund, at \$1.5 million, will cover the entire cost of pulling in the utilities and building the road which is estimated at approximately \$1 million. Permission has been granted by the Diocese to begin this process and the plan is to break ground for this construction sometime in the mid to late Spring.

"All of those things are necessary steps in moving forward with the building planning and eventual construction," said Father Terriquez. "Once we find a suitable buyer for St. Paul's, I believe we will be very close to beginning construction."

Holy Spirit has purchased property off of Gathe Road to accommodate a new church, parish hall/cafeteria and school, which will be built in phases, as the necessary funding is identified. So far parishioners have pledged about \$1.9 million for the project. The rest is expected to be financed through continued fundraising efforts, the sale of St. Paul's, and eventually, St. Anthony's church and school, and the sale of excess property near the new church and school site.

The Finance Council meets once monthly to discuss Income and Expenses for the previous month and make decisions regarding any extraordinary expenditures that come about. Pat Hermanson is our council President and Richard Hanft is our Vice President. Other members of the council are Phil Blick, Lori Parker and Jane Tweeten. Paul Yochum also attends the meetings representing the Pastoral Council. These folks do a great job. When you see them, tell them thanks.

New Building Fund: Phase one of the Capital Campaign is going well. Pledge payments are coming in, and the savings account is growing. We publish the dollar amounts in the weekly bulletin. It is never too late to donate to the new building. If you have any questions give me a call at 232-1196. **Please remember to write a SEPARATE CHECK for your building fund donations or payments. These funds go to a different account from our general funds for the church.**

Maintenance: General maintenance on all three properties continues as usual. There were a few large expenses over the summer. The north side furnace at St Joseph's was replaced at a cost of \$4,837.26. The sprin-

kler system at St Paul's was an ongoing struggle for most of the summer. The cost for these repairs was approximately \$1,982.59. Thanks to Mike Miller, (who did most of the work) the cost was a lot less than it could have been.

The **IDAHO CATHOLIC APPEAL** is coming up in February 2008. Please considering giving generously to this endeavor. The ICA is the largest fundraiser for the diocese and funds numerous ministries throughout the year.

We are still asking parishioners who receive the Idaho Catholic Register to pay the yearly payment of \$17.00. Of the 556 papers sent to Holy Spirit parishioners, 155 have paid as of 12-5-07. Any amount not paid by the subscribers will be paid out of the parishes general funds.

You can still sign up for Electronic Fund Transfers to donate your monthly contribution. EFT's are deducted on the 15th of the month from your checking or savings accounts and will show on your monthly statement from the bank. If you would like to sign up, please fill out the enclosed form and return it to me. You can put it in the collection basket, mail it, or drop it off at the office. EFT'S can also be used for your pledges to the New Building Fund.

Elementary Religious Education

Our parish-wide elementary religious education program is progressing very smoothly. Children in Kindergarten through sixth grade meet regularly on Monday evenings from 5:30-6:60pm in the Holy Spirit School main building. We currently have well over 70 children registered and consistently in attendance, with six classrooms in use. The staff is composed of several volunteer catechists, dedicated highly qualified parishioners and Holy Spirit School teachers.

The lessons are interlaced with fun hands-on activities and engaging methods of teaching our faith to young children through discussion, handouts and social interactions. The curriculum is the same as followed by the students in Holy Spirit School for all the grades, but concentrated to meet the needs of a once-a-week gathering.

Special emphasis is placed on those children preparing for their First Reconciliation and First Communion this spring. This class is historically the largest in number, and requires significant extra preparation on the part of the teachers, students and their families. First Reconciliation is scheduled for February 9, 2008, at 11am, and First Communion weekend is April 26 and 27th. Both Sacrament celebrations will take place at St. Anthony Chapel, with further information available as the dates near.

Saint Joseph's

The Preservation of St. Joseph's Chapel

St. Joseph's Chapel was dedicated on December 19, 1897 and is the oldest congregational Catholic Church in Idaho. A committee has been active in restoring the chapel to the way it appeared prior to the mid-1930's and to making necessary structural repairs. A summary of the committee's work, it's history and plans for future activities follows.

When the St. Joseph's School and the Bannock House was sold in May, 2005; \$50,000 of the \$258,300 gain was set aside to address structural needs of the St. Joseph's Chapel building. This action was originated by the Finance Council and approved by the Parish Council.

The Finance Council commissioned a Historical Architect / Architectural Conservator named Frederick Walters who was a stone /masonry expert from the Oregon State University to study the Chapel and make recommendations for restoration. The Idaho Heritage Trust paid for Mr. Walters' visits and a detailed structural report was issued on May 3, 2005. The condition of the Chapel was rated as "good" but repointing of some mortar, replacement of specific stones and various recommendations of items needing repair were identified.

In January 2007, Father Enrique commissioned a task force to address the needs of the Chapel. Notices seeking volunteers were published in the January 14 and 21, 2007 bulletins and an article was included in the February 2007 Holy Spirit News. The following members volunteered and the first committee meeting was held on January 27, 2007:

The committee has met nine times in 2007 to set goals, priorities and make recommendations for Father Enrique's approval.

To date the following improvements have been made to the Chapel:

- ✦ Rain flashing has been placed to direct water in the steeple area to the downspouts,
- ✦ Pigeon excrement has been removed and screens placed to keep the birds from entering the roof
- ✦ A trade was made with the Shoshone Bannock Tribes to procure stones from the old Whitestone

Inn which was quarried from the same Fort Hall Quarry as the St. Joseph's stone.

- ✦ 22 stones at the church entrance, the archway above the side door, the window on the steeple and on the steeple itself have been replaced by stoneworkers from Portneuf Valley Masonry.
- ✦ A new baptismal font replicating the original font was constructed and dedicated on November 25, 2007.
- ✦ An ambry for the display of the Holy Oils was constructed and dedicated on November 25th.
- ✦ A new front altar matching the design of the 1922 rear altar has been constructed and will be dedicated on December 23, 2007.

The new baptismal font, ambry and front altar were purchased with donations from the Catherine Garner family.

The following additional work has been discussed and approved for the future:

- ✦ Repair of the buttress stone (a \$7000 grant was received from the Idaho Heritage Trust to help on this effort).
- ✦ Construct new candle holders consistent with the architecture of the rear altar.
- ✦ Construct a small segment of the altar railing that was in place in the original Chapel.
- ✦ Conduct an electrical evaluation of the Chapel and act on necessary upgrades.
- ✦ Refinish the front entrance doors and archway consistent with the original chapel.
- ✦ Repair the Plexiglas window coverings and make necessary repairs to window frames.
- ✦ Continue with appropriate stone repairs as funding permits.

On Saturday, December 1, 2007, our school sent three teams to compete in the FIRST LEGO League competition held in Idaho State University's Reed Gym. The huge event included 43 teams, with several traveling from communities as far away as Idaho Falls and northern Utah. The competition was open to all schools and students of middle school age (6th through 9th grades), and was divided into four categories: presentation, teamwork, robot design and missions (robot tasks).

All three Holy Spirit teams earned trophies for their efforts, and all three teams will be heading to Boise on January 26, 2007, to compete at the state level for the FIRST LEGO League Competition. Team "Chaos Faction" received 1st place in Presentation; Team "Power Zone" received 2nd place in the Presentation category, and Team "Black Panthers" received 2nd place in the Teamwork category.

Our sixth graders would not have achieved such success without the collaboration and support of Idaho Power and Merlin's Insulation, and of course their teachers, Peggy Kaiser, Dawn Fitzpatrick and Kelsey Seipel, an ISU graduate chemistry student. Peggy, Dawn and Kelsey dedicated countless hours and personal energy coaching these students.

As a major component of the competition, each team had to choose a facility and research how to both conserve and save energy within designated buildings. They chose our school, St. Anthony Chapel and the Holy Spirit Gymnasium, developing an extensive energy plan for each building.

This was a truly hands-on learning experience for the

children as each participated in the evaluation of our energy needs. The students presented the information that they had gathered into a cohesive and comprehensive plan to Holy Spirit's Finance Council, Parish Council and School Board, and learned from their intensive research that they, as children, could really make a difference in energy savings for our entire church and school community.

We are immensely proud and congratulations to our sensational sixth graders! Good luck at the finals!
